# Celebrating Ten Years of Noodlemania it's.... Layout On A Shoestring Budget, Est. 1992 Conducted By: Peter Maurath

Welcome back to issue five of our yearlong retro-LOASSB's. This month's issue digs deep into the archives, back nearly ten years to May 1993. The lead-in article this month was a report by a James Duffy on the experimental X2000 high-speed train being tested by Amtrak on the NEC. Treasurer Brad Beaubien told us about his small Willow Creek model railroad, and Pivot Pin John Riechel introduced us to the TAMR National Layout (well it wasn't technically our layout, just his home layout with a different name, go figure!) Jeremy Amudsen was president; Phil Michaels editor and we were still without a western rep. The issue closed with a brief article from NER rep Mike Thideman on the W. Springfield show, and the ever-popular Traction Motor, column by Zachary Gooch (think MR Bull Session).

### HOTBOX #281 MAY 1993

This time around I have chosen a creative and fun project with some basic materials.

Unless you're modeling a rural area, or an early time period, this attention getting project should easily fit into your layout. Today most people travel by car, so naturally, highways were created. And at some point along the way these highways had to cross rivers, valleys, or urban areas on overpasses. These bridges usually cost in the millions of dollars to construct. But the overpass we're building, with a little ingenuity, can be built for less than twenty-five dollars. The only materials needed, and you might already have them, are some square and round dowels, foam core board, illustration board, and some spaghetti noodles.

The first thing is to find the location you will be building the bridge, so you can measure the distance for it. Next, cut your illustration board to size, with the width varying depending on the size of your road and the scale. Then cut out a matching piece of foam core board. This is the basic deck. Glue the two pieces together and let it set for awhile to dry. The pillars, or supports, are made from the dowels. Cut the square dowel the width of the bridge. Cut the round dowels to the desired height. Next, paint on a concrete color, I chose Pactra Acrylic Dark Gull Gray. Once they've dried, glue the two round dowels to the square dowel and make your supports. Glue them to your deck bottom.

Afterwards you can add railings, a median, and lighting using the streetlight method from earlier articles. With a little thought and hard work, you'll have a real eye catcher

### **WNY Convention A Success!**

Rare power sightings included 1 CSX SD70MAC in CR colors, an HLCX SD40-2 in BN colors, 1 FURX SD40-3M, 1 CEFX SD40-2 "Gray Ghost", 2 UP SD70Ms, 1 UP SD70M w/ flairs, 1 SP SD70M (actually clean, too!), 1 UP SD60M, 1 UP SD40-2, 2 CSX AC4400CWs (not common around here) and 2 ex-CR C40-8Ws. Currently, they are parked on the R.I.P. track in the Rochester, NY Yard (Goodman Street Yard). These units are extensively damaged and it is very unlikely that they will be fixed up to run again (according to my CSX resources). 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
Hello all! My name is Nicholas Wilson and I am writing as a guest for L.O.A.S.S.B. this month. This is the second part of "The 4 Seasons" series ad this month we're going to do summer for those of you who aren't winter fans! So sit back and get ready for another edition of L.O.A.S.S.B.!


What do you think of when you think of summer (besides railfanning!)? Maybe green grass, flowers, and trees. Well, here's how to make those things! For grass, simply go to an Art Supply store and buy a big sheet of green felt (or whatever that cheap, fuzzy stuff is). I've found it's almost perfect for grass! As for flowers, you go no farther than your basement. If your dryer has a fuzz collector, look inside it. There, you should find many brightly colored bits of fuzz perfect for flowers (if you don't have a washer, go to your local laundry mat and ask them if you could use some of there fuzz. Be sure to explain why so they don't get the wrong impression of you!). For trees, just go outside, cut off a little twig with lots of smaller twigs growing off of it near the too. When you have that, take some nice, thick, green moss, bunch it up into a ball, and stick it to the tree. For those of you who prefer more realism, then go to your local hobby shop and buy the stuff made by Woodland Scenics.

Another familiar thing about summer is the beach! To model the beach, first get a decent sized chunk of your layout available for the project. You then build a watertight box 3 inches tall so it meets the rest of the layout. (Fig. 1) On one side of that area, fill it with sand right up to the top. On the other side, fill it with water died blue (or brown or green or whatever color you want!). After you're finished, you have a beach! You may also want to add a nearby parking lot made of plaster and painted black. However, you may want to add details to your beach. A common site is volleyball net. To do this, take 2 toothpicks (painted gray or silver) and put them in the sand about 2 inches from each other (Fig. 2). Press them down in so they're about 1 inch high. Afterwards, get a piece of screening like the stuff on a screen door and cut it so it's 2 inches wide and ¼ of an inch tall. Then take that piece and attach each end to one of the toothpicks using model cement/glue. You know have volleyball net!

Other things seen in the summer time are plants, some of which are grown in green houses. In order to model a green house, simply take the package of a glue stick and cut the front clear plastic part off so it looks like half of a cylinder. Take that piece and very carefully (do NOT puncture it) with an X-acto knife, scrape little lines into the top f it going all the way around. Then take the knife and cut a little door into the one side of it (the one with a flat side, not a round side). Stick that somewhere on your layout and you now have a greenhouse!

Convention site, Part 1 (North Dakota): Currently is at my house, but the Chieftain Motel in Carrington will be used if the number attendees grows too large.

Convention site, Part 2 (Minnesota): Andy will have to supply the info for this one.

Maps: A map to my house and of nearby motel locations will be provided with registration. A ND highway map should also be included (sorry, no Minnesota map, ND maps are free, MN charges for their maps!)

Non-Railroad Activities: Notify me if you wish to have information about non-railroad activities. ND and MN are great places to fish, and there are several areas of interest to see. The Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul have a lot of various things to see.

Schedule: The schedule is printed here and one will be supplied with registration. The schedule is subject to change, especially if there are more people attending the convention.

Clinics and slide shows: If you wish to give a clinic or slide show, let me know and it will be worked into the schedule.

Layout tours: There will be several layout tours in MN and ND including the HO clubs in Bismarck and Wilton, ND, and a tour is currently being set up with Bob Rivard's famed HO scale Soo Line layout.

"Excursions:" You probably wonder why excursions is in quotation marks. ND doesn't have a particular excursion, rather a ride in a caboose around the McHenry Loop, which is a reverse loop built at the end of a branch line (more on this later). The other "excursion" is a trip down part of a former Northern Pacific branch line in an old trolley, mor on this later too.

Transportation: Trains, planes, and automobiles, that's the three ways of getting here. Amtrak provides service to several stations in the state, but I will only be planning on providing transport from Fargo, ND, and possibly Devils Lake, ND (for those of you coming from the west). Unfortunately, new Amtrak policies don't allow you to check baggage at either of these stations anymore. This shouldn't be a problem, though, unless you pack a lot! There is also Amtrak service to the Twin Cities, but unless you can find another way to get to ND from there, that station will be used only for those of you traveling back (or you can return from Fargo if you wish). Hector International Airport is located in Fargo, and there is also an international airport in the Twin Cities (Andy, you will have to get the name of that). As for driving, all the roads are great! Interstate I-94 misses my house by only 30 miles and passes right through the Twin Cities. Unlike Ohio, we are less likely to see the nice orange roadside flowers (or Schneider turds, if you prefer) on every highway, nor should we have to drive on the interstate shoulder as a detour lane! Reminders: ND and MN are usually not that cold in the summer! Be sure to bring shorts (as well as at least one pair of long pants), because temps will range from 70 to 90 degrees. The humidity has also been quite high these past nine years, so be prepared. You may also wish to bring along a good rope and anchor, because it does get pretty windy sometimes! June weather is also temperamental in ND and MN. It could be clear one day (or one minute) and a raging thunderstorm the next. Don't forget to bring a lot of film, and remember that film is pretty useless without a camera!

# Additional Information

#### **McHenry Loop RR**

This operation was developed in 1982 after Burlington Northern announced it was planning to abandon a section of a former Northern Pacific branch from Binford to McHenry, ND. Avis Lowe and other locals wished to preserve the track at McHenry because of its unusual design, a reverse loop to turn entire trains rather than a wye or turntable. The city acquired the track and later purchased an ex-NP caboose and a Whitcomb switch engine. Also on the property is an ex-NP snowplow that was damages while plowing the McHenry line. The original NP depot was removed in years past, so the Glenfield depot was brought in. This is strange because the Glenfield depot is former Great Northern, thus causing one of NP's biggest competitors to have a station to serve an operation on one of their lines. The ride lasts about 20 minutes and cost only a dollar.

#### **Ft. Lincoln Trolley**

The Fort Lincoln trolley is an old trolley, once used in Bismarck, ND, that now runs on a section of a former Northern Pacific branch line from the south side of Bismarck to Fort Lincoln, which is located several miles south of Bismarck. The line parallels the Missouri River and travels through a very scenic area. Fort Lincoln was the last permanent home of Custer before he set out on his doomed expedition which ended in a massacre at Little Big Horn, Montana.

#### ND State Railroad Museum

This museum has several interesting items including an ex-Soo caboose, ex-BN, CB&Q caboose, and several old freight cars. Also on hand is a presumably home built "critter" that BN used around its Mandan, ND, facilities. A structure you wouldn't normally find at a museum set away from the tracks is a railroad bridge. It was moved in off of a nearby NP branch line. There is also a model railroad on display.

#### **Bismarck and Beyond**

Bismarck, ND, could almost be considered the start of the west. It's where the Missouri River separates the flatter portion of ND from the hilly region to the west leading up to the Rockies. This makes for the area west and north of Bismarck to be extremely scenic, something you wouldn 't think of in ND!

#### Valley City, ND

This is another scenic area of the state. A huge valley created by the Sheyenne River made it a difficult area for the railroads to cross, so the Northern Pacific built a massive, 3600 foot long bridge to span the valley. The huge steel structure is almost always visible when looking north from most spots in Valley City. If that wasn't enough, the Soo Line built down into the valley and crossed under the bridge, and making a difficult climb out of the valley. At one time there was even an interurban railway in the city! This is truly a great spot to visit!

#### **Bob Rivard's Soo Line Layout**

This HO scale layout has graced the pages of *Model Railroader's Great Model Railroads* and Bob has had over 400 articles published in numerous periodicals over the past decades! The layout very accurately depicts the Soo Line around the Twin Cities and is complemented by a fleet of locomotives and cars that were all built based on photos of the real thing, this is one layout you don't want to miss!

#### The Wilton Model Railroad Club

This club is housed in the former Soo Line depot at Wilton, ND. The layout depicts several towns in ND in HO scale. The layout is pretty neat to see, and on TAMR's last visit to the layout we were allowed to run trains on it as well.

#### The Buckstop Jct. Layout

This HO layout is currently uncontested for being the largest layout in ND! No one is sure how long the mainline is, but it takes a train 10 minutes to traverse it at average speed, nonstop! The layout is still under heavy construction as it was begun only a few years ago, but it is still amazing to see!

#### MN Transportation Museum, Jackson Street Roundhouse:

Former GN roundhouse with dozens of pieces of rolling stock on display. They range from steam to diesel and much more. It is still a working roundhouse today, with operating turntable, etc. For pictures and more head to www.mtmuseum.org

#### **Bandana Square**

O scale layout in old NP shops, seen in MR and extremely impressive! It is on much of the upper floor and depicts railroading the lower part of Minnesota throughout the last five decades.

#### Dayton's Bluff, University, and other railfanning locations

There is so much railfanning that it could easily fill pages. Railroads include Soo, BNSF, UP, TCW, CN, MNNR, Amtrak, and Progressive Rail. These locations can be seen in plenty of magazine photos and video productions. The action has been rated among the best in the country, comparable to Chicago and KC. So be sure to bring plenty of film and camara batteries along with you so you won't miss a thing!


