
statement on why you want



First it would require a change of all of our printed materials, including this newsletter, pamphlets, flyers, banners, not to mention any advertisements out there (i.e. MRN, MR), so they'll be expenses there. Second, our non-profit 501c7 tax status is with our present name, any change is going to require filings with the IRS, and I don't even want to imagine the paperwork. Issue 2: Selkirk, NY

Hello all, and welcome back to my column Doug's Railfan Recommendations. These are places I have been to and found to be good spots for different reasons.

Selkirk, NY is located just outside of Albany, the Capitol of New York. Fairly easy to get to and only about 2 hrs from Syracuse,

NY; and W. Springfield, MA (home of the TAMR Winter Convention.) Selkirk holds the largest hump yard in the northeast. It serves all trains that go to, and come from New York City, Boston, Vermont, New Hampshire, Cleveland, Chicago, & many more points.

Great spots I have found are:

Bens Bridge - Ben's bridge is located off of RT 9w near the South Albany Airport. The great thing about Bens bridge is it goes over the heart of CSX's Selkirk Yard. From the bridge

you have a clear view of the engine fueling racks, hump hill and yard, engine servicing facility, receiving/staging yard (for the hump), and an auto rack unloading facility. Selkirk Yard is owned and operated by the CSX rail corporation but welcomes all rail-road locomotives.

While on some of my visits I have seen CSX, Conrail (owned before the merger), NS, UP, CP, CN, Wisconsin Central, Bay Colony, BNSF, 1 Chicago & North Western loco, and numerous leasing engines. Always good stuff on hand.

<u>Game Farm Rd.</u> - Game Farm Rd is located just west of the yard and crosses the double track mainline. There is a small parking area just feet from the tracks. While at the grade crossing if you look to your west you will see a signal which is great for those who don't have scanners yet. Here you can catch all the west and east bound traffic coming from Chicago and points in between.

<u>Voorheesville, NY</u> - Voorheesville is a small town west of Game Farm Rd. Many years ago Voorheesville was home to a diamond (as seen on older TAMR tape from there) which was used by the former D&H & Conrail. The diamond was removed about 5-6 yrs ago but the traffic continues.

An awesome parking area sits across the street from the tracks and you have a long view in both directions. on average, trains pass about every 30-35 min. There are time when, like anywhere else, you'll have the 1-2 hr lull.



Also while in Voorheesville, Stop by the Voorheesville Diner. It's located right next to the tracks and is a great breakfast location. I usually get the window seat facing the tracks and have video camera/ still camera ready for action.

We finish our review this month with some trivia

The Ernest Borgnine's characters nickname "Shack" is derived from the fact that he is the Conductor of a freight train and there place on a freight was most often in the Caboose which was commonly dubbed "The Shack." Ironically Borgnine's character was not seen inside his "namesake" as was more often seen in locomotive # 19.

The part of "Hogger" (the Engineer) was veteran actor Malcolm Atterbury's final film role. His father was once president of the Pennsylvania Railroad.

The Original Title of the movie was going to be "Emperor of the North Pole" which was the tongue and cheek title of the "King of the Hobos." It was felt that naming the movie this might confuse some movie goers. The Emperor of the North Pole is the Hobos way of making fun of themselves, there way of saying "So what if I am king?" "King of What?" The hobos had nothing so being there king was like being King or Emperor of the North Pole which despite the lofty title is a barren wasteland and is like being the ruler of nothing.

The opening of the moving includes a short history to set ting up the atmosphere for the movie. It is mentioned that "The Railroad Man stood between the Hobo and the Train." While it is true that crews were on the lookout to keep Hobos off the train their relationship was not as antagonistic as portrayed in the movie. Often times in the cold Railroaders would invite hobos into the locomotive or caboose to help them out. Hobos often would help the Railroad as well. One Hobo was dubbed a hero by the New Haven Railroad in 1938 during "The Hurricane of '38" by successfully warning and and stopping a passenger train on the Shoreline (the present day Northeast Corridor) successfully averting disaster.

The Home of Number 19

The film was shot in and around the city of Cottage Grove, Oregon along the right-of-way of the Oregon Pacific and Eastern Railway (OP&E). Willis Kyle, President and owner of the OP&E in 1972, allowed the film company unlimited access to make the film. Oregon, Pacific and Eastern's rolling stock including two steam locomotives (one of these being #19, a type 2-8-2 Mikado), appear in the film. Also featured in the film is the Dorena Reservoir, located about 10 miles east of Cottage Grove, and OP&E's railyard in downtown Cottage Grove.

The Oregon, Pacific & Eastern Ry. Co. operated 16.6 miles from an interchange with the Southern Pacific at Cottage Grove, east to Culp Creek, OR.

The line opened in 1904 from Cottage Grove to Wildwood, 18 miles, as the Oregon & Southeastern RR. The OP&E was incorporated in 1912 and purchased the assets of the O&SE in 1914. The OP&E was reorganized in 1940 under the same name.

The OP&E was purchased by the Booth-Kelley Lumber Co. in 1947. It remained a B-K property until 1959, when Georgia-Pacific purchased Booth-Kelley, including the OP&E.

The railroad was purchased from Georgia-Pacific in 1970 by Row River Industries (itself jointly owned by Kyle Railways and Bohemia, Inc.). Passenger excursions were operated from 1972 until 1987. Bohemia, Inc., acquired Kyle Railway's shares of the line in 1987. As of March, 1986, the line owned 3 locomotives (the 11, 21, and 602), 31 box cars, and 44 flat cars.

The line was abandoned in 1994. And the line has since become a Bike Path.

In 1926, prior to the Filming of the Emperor of the North, the first of at least three movies was filmed on the line. Silent film "The General" starring Buster Keaton about the famous Civil War locomotive chase was filmed and even involved a scene where a temporary bridge was built across the Row River and a locomotive was driven over it as it collapsed into the river.

Apparently the remains were later salvaged and nothing remains there today.

In 1986, the last major movie to be made on the line was "Stand by Me". ●
