CLEVELAND ON THE RAILS

A few things you might want to know before coming here so you can impress everyone with your mad skills.



Despite what you may have heard on the late shows, Cleveland is alive and well. We've had a tumultuous history, and despite our setbacks over the years we've persevered and capitalized on our strengths making us the first choice for world class health care, the arts and darn good bratwurst (sorry for the chamber of commerce bit, but us Clevelanders are a little sensitive about defending our town) Railroads have played a key role in Cleveland's development over the centuries. What started out as a small settlement on the shores of lake Erie in 1796 quickly grew into a busy industrial center courtesy of the rich mineral deposits within the state of Ohio and a connection to the Ohio and Erie canal system. Eventually railroads supplanted the canals, and Cleveland became the crossroads of numerous major rail systems including the Nickel Plate, Pennsylvania, Baltimore and Ohio, Wheeling and Lake Erie, Erie, and the New York Central. Steel mills, auto plants and other manufacturing grew as did the city necessitating larger terminals, more tracks, rail transit, and eventually The Terminal Tower.

Completed in 1930 it was then the tallest building between New York and Chicago and the largest station complex in the US if not the world. A city within a city they called it. Built to replace an outdated Union Station from the civil war era, the 42 story tower consolidated trains of the NYC, NKP, as well as trolley's from the east and west sides of the city. Alas today all that is left is the light rail service into the terminal (Amtrak has a small modern station along the lake). The complex was converted into a mall/office complex in the early 90's and is still quite prominent on the Cleveland skyline. A bit of trivia the complex was built by the Van Sweringen brother's who at the time owned a few railroads including the NKP and the C&O. Despite never having a single line into Cleveland. The C&O Ry would have there main HQ's in Cleveland up into the 1980's. Today Cleveland is still a busy town for the railroads. Mergers have left us with CSX, and NS carrying the lion share of traffic through town. A handful of smaller regional and shortline carriers exist such as a reborn Wheeling and Lake Erie, The Newburgh and South Shore, and the Flats Industrial RR. With us being almost halfway between Chicago and New York and on the quickest route between the two cities, nearly all traffic bound for the east coast, as well as much of the west coast traffic goes right through here, not to mention the many industries still served right here by rail. Cleveland truly is a great place to train watch, and it's rich history affords many great museums and scenic rr's dedicated to preserving that history. Most of which we will see during the convention, including the Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railway, and the Mad River Rail Museum (more info on these later). For railfanning few spots across the country can beat Berea, OH. This small suburb located just southwest of Cleveland boasts not only the Browns training camp, but the intersection of two major lines. The NS Chicago line (former NYC Chicago Line), and the CSX Columbus Line(former Big -4 line to Indianapolis, later NYC also). At this spot nearly every train that goes through Cleveland not to mention New York or Chicago passes through here, including Amtrak, should you want to get up real early.

Bustling with activity from the busy heavy mainlines of today's modern rail carriers, to the rich history in the museums and scenic trips. Cleveland, was and still is a town of railroads. \bullet

Layout Tours:

GOLD CREEK RAILWAY by Paul Novak & Sons at 28345 Hunters Ridge Lane, Olmstead Twp. Tel: 440-235-2611. **Take I-480 to Exit 3 Stearns Rd. South on Stearns to Cook Rd. Left (East) on Cook, to first left which is MacKenzie Road. Turn left on MacKenzie and go 1/3rd mile to Hunters Ridge Lane. Turn left on Hunters Ridge, 3rd house on left**. New for this year is an industrial expansion to the layout with more sidings, runarounds, and factory locations. Take sidewalk around to back of house and enter train room through stairway. HO, 36' long walk around 85% scenery. Free lance bridge line in Montana, interchanging with Milwaukee Rd. and C&NW. Hand-laid track. Six operating positions with block control and home made throttles. Enter at side door.

CUYAHOGA VALLEY AND WEST SHORE MODEL RR CLUB at 25802 Garfield, Olmsted Falls (c/o Doug Steiskal 216-524-6266). North of Bagley Road, west off S.R. 252 (Columbia Road). A good rail fanning spot. The Cuyahoga Valley and West Shore has built a new HO model railroad with double deck operation. Bench work utilizes steel structural members. The railroad is more than twice the size of the old railroad. CTC., DCC.

CAUTION: DO NOT CROSS OR STAND CLOSE TO THE TRACKS. THESE ARE VERY ACTIVE TRACKS.

NorthernOhio Railway Museum:

(NORM) was founded in 1965 and incorporated in 1976 as a not-for-profit education and historical organization. Our goals are to collect, preserve, restore, operate and display streetcars and other railway related equipment. In essence, to preserve a vanishing era--the trolley era. The museum is located at 5515 Buffham Road in Westfield Township, Medina County, Ohio (near Chippewa Lake). There, on two miles of the historic Cleveland Southwestern Railway, the museum is working towards its goals to collect, preserve, restore, display and operate streetcars and other railway equipment for use by the public. We are open for public display Saturday afternoons Spring thru Fall.

Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railway:

This scenic train winds through the Cuyahoga Valley National Park System. A gem of a valley located just minutes outside of Cleveland. We'll be riding the "National Park Scenic", an Approximately three hour round-trip through the park.

Mad River Rail way Museum:

Located In Bellevue, OH approximately one hour west of Cleveland. This museum, founded in 1976, features numerous pieces of rolling stock and artifacts dating back to the earliest days of railroading in Ohio. Situated on land bordering the Wheeling and Lake Erie, and NS Mainlines, equipment includes the first dome car ever built, several restored troop sleepers, a small restored LS&MS depot, an N&W training car and much, much more

Contests:

There will be three major contests during the convention: Photo, Model Structure, and Model Rolling Stock (this includes locomotives). Entries are to be received Friday during registration with voting, judging, and awards given on Sunday night.

Clinics and Slide Shows:

I will be hosting a slide show as well as a clinic this year, and there is still space available if any other attendee wishes to do one as well. We do have digital projectors and computers available.
