

HOW TO USE THIS DIRECTORY ---

The format of this year's Directory is basically the same as in the past. Addresses and other information about each member appears in regional listings. To find out what region a particular member is in, there is also an alphabetical listing in the front of this Directory. To look for members close to you, simply look through your own regional listing. The territory covered by each region is shown on the region map. A typical listing might be as follows:


